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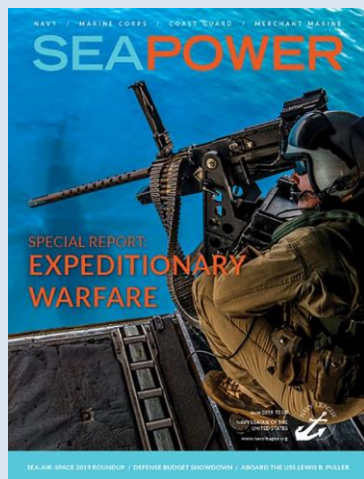
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Santa Fe High School's JROTC Continues State Championship Streak

SANTA FE, NM -- The junior ROTC team from Santa Fe High School has won more than 400 trophies in the past four years. Last month, they won the state championship for the 4th time in a row.

"It's extremely rare being 4-year state champions. It's never heard of, but it's not just an individual effort. It's a team effort," said Jeremy Gonzalez, Senior.

So that's why the cadets who will soon graduate want other team members to keep working hard.

"I remember just practicing quite literally every single day before and after school. Even during my senior year, if I had a free period, I would come here and practice during the day, during school," said Mateo Romero, Senior.



Another senior, Jason Aragon, said JROTC changes cadets for the better. He said he was shy and quiet until he joined the organization. We strive together," said Gonzalez.

Greetings everyone!

What a busy spring this has been! Every spring the New Mexico Council awards 20+ Theodore Roosevelt Leadership awards to Navy and Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (NJROTC and MCJROTC) students at high schools in New Mexico and west Texas with a NJROTC or MCJROTC unit. I went to two high schools this spring to present the Theodore Roosevelt Leadership award and presented a Marine Corps officer's sword to a member of the Navy ROTC unit at the University of New Mexico during their award ceremony.

The Navy League is one of several organizations to present awards at the NJROTC and MCJROTC annual award ceremonies. I am glad to see youth participating in junior ROTC and the Sea Cadets program; I believe kids learn to be accountable for their actions, are held to high standards, learn to work as a member of a team and acquire other good traits through the ROTC and Sea Cadets programs. Thank you, Ron Olexsak, for coordinating all our junior ROTC awards and arranging presenters for many of the award ceremonies.

Another presentation this spring was to award a \$750 scholarship to Hieu Ngo,

a Navy Reservist who is studying at the University of New Mexico to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Emergency Medical Services. Congratulations Hieu!

The Navy League of the U. S. supports a strong Navy which includes several Carrier Strike Groups (CSGs). I read in the June 9th edition of the Albuquerque Journal that the USS Abraham Lincoln CSG is sailing in the Arabian Sea, showing a U. S. presence in that area of the world. The Commander of U. S. Central Command, Marine Corps General Frank McKenzie, commented that he "thinks Iran had been planning some sort of attack on shipping or U. S. forces in Iraq". His assessment was that "if we had not reinforced [with a CSG], it is entirely likely that an attack would have taken place by now". General McKenzie stated "we believe they [the Iranians] are recalculating. They have to take this [the presence of the CSG] into account as they think about various actions that they might take. So we think this is having a very good stabilizing effect". The Lincoln CSG consists of the aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln with its Carrier Air Wing Seven aircraft consisting of F-18E and F Super Hornets, E-2D Hawkeyes for early warning, EA-18G Growlers for electronic warfare, and Seahawk helicopters for mine warfare; and accompanying destroyers and cruisers and supply ships. There is nothing like the close presence of a CSG to get another country's attention. The men and women of the Lincoln CSG should be in the Arabian Sea for several months; I will be praying for their safe return and I encourage you, if so inclined, to do likewise. USS Santa Fe Returns to Homeport by Shaun Griffin, Commander Submarine Forces Pacific Public Affairs

PEARL HARBOR, HAWAII – The Los Angeles-class fast attack submarine USS Santa Fe (SSN 763) returned to Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam from deployment April 22. "I am exceptionally proud of the crew's efforts to prepare for, sustain, and successfully execute every phase of this deployment," said Cmdr. Chris Hedrick, a native of Glendale, California, and Santa Fe's commanding officer. "As commanding officer, it has been my privilege to lead such a fine group of professional young men in carrying out our nation's most important tasking, and I could not be prouder of their accomplishments."

During the deployment, 22 enlisted Sailors and three officers earned their submarine warfare qualification. "Our purpose is to be ready for battle at any time," said Hedrick. "During our pre-deployment and throughout our deployment preparing and being ready for battle at any time was first and foremost in our mind." Hedrick said the crews' focus and battle mindedness enabled successful operations and led to a high level of achievement from the crew.



"My most memorable achievement during deployment was earning my dolphins," said Electronics Technician (Submarine) 3rd Class Dakota Collison, from Chestertown, Maryland. "The most important thing I will take away from this deployment is never to be afraid to ask for help because we are all a team. We have to depend on each other for even the smallest tasks at sea."

While deployed, Santa Fe executed a port call to Stirling, Western Australia, and hosted submariners from the Royal Australian Navy Submarine Force. They also had the opportunity

to conduct community outreach projects by volunteering at the Perth Zoo and the Native Arc Wildlife Refuge center.

"Having the opportunity to help give back to the country that was hosting us during our port call was a rewarding experience," said Fire Control Technician 2nd class Nicolas Tankersley, from Bradenton, Florida.



Upon returning to Pearl Harbor, Master Chief Sonar Technician (Submarine) James McGarrah, from Newburgh, New York, and Santa Fe's Chief of the Boat, expressed his appreciation for the hard work and dedication put forth by the crew that made this a successful deployment. Commissioned on Jan. 8, 1994, Santa Fe is the 52nd ship of the Los Angeles-class and is homeported in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Navy Plans to Shoot Nuclear Missile from New Columbia Class Sub by Fox News, May 23, 2019

Almost nobody knows where they are at any given time, yet nuclear-armed ballistic missile submarines quietly patrol dark domains of the undersea realm in strategically vital waters around the globe, bringing the prospect of unprecedented destruction upon potential enemies -- all as a way to keep peace.

The Navy is preparing to shoot its Trident II D5 nuclear missile from its emerging new Columbia-class submarine as part of a plan to launch the boat's first patrol ahead of schedule in the late 2020s.



"We will go through the standard strategic weapons testing and eventually do a test shot to prove out the weapons system before it goes on its first patrol," Capt. John Rucker, Program Manager, Columbia-class Fleet Ballistic Missile Submarines, said at the Navy League Sea Air Space Symposium. "They are doing all of the qualifications right now and are on track to finish in July," he added.
