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

## Navy Week Albuquerque Brings Adventure to Our City!

Three sailors from the Virginia-class submarine USS NEW MEXICO (SSN-779) visited the Southwest Learning Center in Albuquerque on Thursday, September 15<sup>th</sup> as part of Navy Week Albuquerque. Albuquerque's Mayor Tim Keller proclaimed September 12-18 as Navy Week in conjunction with the New Mexico State Fair.

LT Curtis (Trey) Olsen from Roseville, CA, ETV1 Jason Cruz from Bronx, NY, and ETN2 Noah Bolin from Brighton, CO have all been on the USS NEW MEXICO for two and half years. Their visit to Southwest Learning Center included the 4th, 5th, and 6th grade classes (72 students total) of Mr. Tom Ottman, Ms. Susannah Martinez, and Ms. Sarah Knight.

For over 90 minutes, students could ask about life aboard the submarine, what made the sailors want to join the Navy, and what their jobs were on the boat. Each student also received a ship's crest lapel pin from the sailors as a way of saying thank you for letting us come to your school. One estimate gave the total number of questions asked by the students at just under 2,000! 😊

We did it once again! The New Mexico chapter of the Navy League of the United States helped to make the connection between our home state and U.S. Navy. This year, it was Albuquerque in the forefront. Timing was everything. We were able to tie together Navy Week with the New Mexico state fair and the efforts to bring in the sail of the former USS Albuquerque and our past support from the New Mexico Pinon Coffee company and the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta.

# USS Albuquerque Sail Project



## USS Albuquerque ‘sails’ into Duke City *by Rick Nathanson / Journal staff writer - Sunday, August 21, 2022*


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When the nuclear-powered submarine USS Albuquerque was commissioned in 1983, then Mayor Harry Kinney jokingly offered the keys to a Rolls Royce to the first captain who could maneuver the sub up the Rio Grande for a port call in Albuquerque. The keys were subsequently passed on to the skipper at each of 13 change-of-command ceremonies, according to history of the ship posted to a city website. The keys eventually made their way back to the Mayor’s Office in 2017, after it was decommissioned, and the submarine – or at least a large chunk of it – is expected to arrive in Albuquerque before the end of this year.

The 362-foot-long Los Angeles class submarine is currently at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Washington state, where it is being dismantled, and the U.S. Navy is making the 52-ton sail from the submarine available to Albuquerque, said Thomas Tozier, the city’s liaison for military and veterans affairs. To be clear, the sail is nothing like the large, wind-swelled sheet of fabric mounted to a tall mast that propels a schooner through the water; rather it is the conning tower that’s mounted on the topside of a submarine, and includes the wing-like structures, or fairwater planes, which project sideways from the tower and aid in underwater stability and steering, Tozier explained.


The New Mexico Council of the Navy League of the United States had been following the final journey of the USS Albuquerque. Knowing that the Navy occasionally allows pieces of decommissioned ships to go to locales that have a tie to those vessels, the league brought it to the attention of Tozier, who brought it to the attention of Mayor Tim Keller. The city bought into the idea with an initial commitment of about \$800,000 allocated in the fiscal year 2023 budget, said Dave Simon, director of the city’s Parks and Recreation Department, which is leading the effort for site selection, planning and design of a monument to house the submarine sail.

Simon said that the involvement of Parks and Rec does not necessarily mean the sail will wind up in a city park. The city has set up a website, [www.ussalbuquerque.org](http://www.ussalbuquerque.org), which offers some history about the submarine, the process for bringing the sail to Albuquerque and a nomination form for people to suggest sites and ideas for monument design features. “We want the monument to be an exciting, dynamic and inspirational space in our city that honors the legacy of all those who served on the submarine,” Simon said.

### HOW WILL THE USS ALBUQUERQUE RETURN HOME?



During Navy Week Albuquerque, at the New Mexico state fair, Greg Trapp had the honor of saying a few words commemorating the move of the sail of Albuquerque.

“It is my honor to be here this morning to give a brief history of USS ALBUQUERQUE. USS ALBUQUERQUE was a Los Angeles-class nuclear attack submarine. She was launched on March 13, 1982 and sponsored by Nancy Domenici. Her hull number was SSN-706, a tribute to the 1706 founding of the city of Albuquerque. ALBUQUERQUE was 361 feet long, almost 33 feet wide, and displaced 5,758 tons. She was armed with four 21-inch torpedo tubes. In addition to firing torpedoes, she could also fire Tomahawk and Harpoon missiles. These statistics, however, do not tell the full story.

ALBUQUERQUE entered service at one of the lowest points in the Cold War. The Soviet Union had invaded Afghanistan in December of 1979, driving relations between the United States and Soviets to new lows. ALBUQUERQUE’s primary mission was to confront the submarines of the Soviet fleet; a very dangerous game of underwater cat-and-mouse. ALBUQUERQUE was also designed to deliver special Operations forces and conduct intelligence gathering. These were especially dangerous classified operations.

ALBUQUERQUE had another mission which was to launch her Tomahawk Land Attack Missiles deep into enemy territory. ALBUQUERQUE performed that mission during the Kosovo War in May of 1999. The Kosovo War is in some ways similar to the current War in Ukraine. Instead of Vladimir Putin, the aggressor was Slobodan Milosevic. Under his leadership, the Serbians engaged in a campaign of ethnic cleansing against the much weaker Albanians. The world was rightfully horrified, and NATO responded with Operation Allied Force, known by the United States as Noble Anvil. USS ALBUQUERQUE was in the Mediterranean with the Theodore Roosevelt Battle Group. By the end of May, USS ALBUQUERQUE had fired a total of ten Tomahawk missiles at Serbian targets. ALBUQUERQUE achieved a 100 percent success rate in those firings, earning her the nickname of Sure Shooter.



USS Albuquerque was transferred to the Pacific in 2006, where she finished her career. USS Albuquerque was in service for over 33 years. Throughout that time, the most important mission USS ALBUQUERQUE had was to help preserve peace between the superpowers. We can this morning be thankful to USS ALBUQUERQUE and to her sailors for preserving that peace.”

## 'Telling the story of New Mexico'

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Although the battleship USS New Mexico was decommissioned in 1946 and scrapped shortly afterward, artifacts from the ship continue to bring it to life and, on Thursday, a number of items from the ship became part of the permanent collection of the New Mexico History Museum in Santa Fe.

Among the items were a ceremonial ship commander's sword, the commander's napkin ring, copies of newsletters printed aboard the ship, a sailor's cap and a 78 rpm recording of Prokofiev's "Peter and the Wolf" in the original cover – music piped over the ship's loudspeakers. The items were laid out briefly in the museum at the New Mexico Veterans Memorial in Albuquerque, where members of the Navy League of the United States, New Mexico Council, formally turned them over to a state history museum curator.

"It's surprising that, in the landlocked state of New Mexico, so many people have served in the U.S. Navy," said council president John Jones, who estimated that 20% of the state's roughly 156,000 veterans served in the Navy.

Many of the items gifted to the history museum were in the private collections of Navy League members who wanted a larger audience to see and enjoy the artifacts. The items, Jones said, "are a link to our heritage and to the fact that New Mexico is tied to the maritime nature of our nation."

Greg Trapp, historian for the Navy League's New Mexico Council, donated many of the items from his private collection. "I think they help tell the story of New Mexico," he said.

The USS New Mexico was commissioned in May 1918 and was the first of its series in the New Mexico class of battleships and the first with turbo-electric transmission. At about 625 feet long, it was considered enormous for its day, said Trapp.

Known as "the Queen of the waves," sailors produced an onboard newsletter called the "Queen's Daily News." A number of those newsletters are among the gifted items. An edition from Aug. 12, 1945, includes homefront articles written by a budding East Coast newspaper columnist named Ed Sullivan, who later went on to host a popular TV show that introduced Americans to the Beatles.


Another newsletter from Aug. 16, 1945, contains crew reaction to the surrender of Japan the day before and how the ship's giant bell, which had been silent since the Dec. 7, 1941, attack on Pearl Harbor, was finally rung. That 1,100 pound bell, said Trapp, has been in the possession of the state since 1948 and is currently in the New Mexico History Museum. A smaller 800-pound bell was removed from the ship during a 1945 repair and wound up in New Mexico shortly thereafter. It is on display at the University of New Mexico.

Other gifts donated by Trapp included a USS New Mexico “flat hat,” also known as a “Donald Duck” hat or a “pancake” hat, a style of hat that was worn between 1918 and early 1941; and a USS New Mexico launch medal dated April 23, 1917, with red, white and blue ribbon.

Lisa Cummings donated the ceremonial sword belonging to her grandfather, John T. Warren, who assumed command of the USS New Mexico on Jan. 6, 1945, after a kamikaze attack killed the previous commander and 29 crewmen.

“I’ve had it since I was a teenager,” Cummings said. “My stepmother passed it on to me and a lot of my grandfather’s other memorabilia. Several of his things are on the new USS New Mexico,” a nuclear-powered Virginia-class submarine launched in 2009. “It was really important to me that people should be able to see these things because they’re so beautiful and because they are part of our history,” she said.

Cathy Notarnicola, curator at the New Mexico History Museum, said “there aren’t a lot of artifacts from the USS New Mexico, so we’re really pleased to accept them.” These items not only help tell the story of the battleship USS New Mexico, she said, but also help tell the story of the history of the state – “a history that most people don’t know about.”
